Our students continue to adjust to the routines and expectations of kindergarten. During the past six weeks, we have worked on several prewriting skills and phonemic awareness skills (rhyming, counting words in a sentence, blending). In math, we have been practicing counting by ones and tens. Although we will not expect every student to count to 100 at this time, we would like each child to be able to count to at least 25 or 30 for our first report card in November. We have also worked on mastering our 2D and 3D shapes. Please continue to reinforce all math and ELA skills taught so far.

We have practiced emergency preparedness in school so students are aware of our safety routines. We practiced walking to the fire hall in case of a need to evacuate the building. We completed all of our fall fire drills as well as a lockdown drill and a bus safety presentation. The students enjoyed viewing the fire trucks and learning all about fire safety both at home and at school.



Social Emotional Learning Corner with Mrs. Eberle



We are well under way into our Second Step program lessons that teach vital Social Emotional Learning skills. Students in grades Kindergarten through 2nd grade receive these lessons on a weekly basis. Our first unit focuses on skills students need to be successful learners. Students have been learning how to be good listeners, focus their attention, use Self-Talk to follow directions and ignore distractions, and how to ask for help appropriately when they need it. Why are these lessons important? Because students who can effectively use these skills are set on a path for academic and social success. Ask your student to tell you the listening rules or show you their attent-o-scope!

Speech Therapy

SPEECH THERAPY FUN FACT – Did you know that SLPs who work in schools, clinics, and hospitals all have the same degree?

The year is off to a great start at Dexter. We have the pleasure of having a graduate student clinician joining us in the speech room until December 8th. She is completing her Master's Degree through Baylor University and will be studying under Ms. Gregory. Mrs. Wisner has developed a Speech Improvement program for our Kindergartners who need a little more exposure to some speech sounds. We have our schedules all set and therapy is under-way. All of the kids have been meeting some new friends and working with some familiar faces. They are learning the rules and expectations of the therapy room and how to take turns using good social skills. Fall and everything October is happening while we work on articulation sounds and great language skills.

You can help by practicing vocabulary terms by having your child define each word

Scare, fog, candy, trick, costume, wizard, pumpkin

Some language ideas

- Read a Halloween book and ask questions about the pictures
- Have your child describe their costume
- Play a guessing game by describing a piece of candy



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FROM THE DESK OF THE PHYSICAL THERAPIST

What a great start to the year! Mrs. Bedard, PT, has had fun catching up with her former students and getting to know her new students.

During our first month of PT sessions, students have worked on fundamental gross motor skills that are essential in the school setting. Students participated in exercises and activities that challenge their strength, balance and coordination.

This month we have worked a lot on single leg exercises because some students have a difficult time with locomotor tasks that require adequate strength and coordination in only one leg, such as skipping and traveling up and down stairs with alternating feet (i.e. one foot on each step). Skipping and walking up and down stairs is a target skill on standardized testing and a benchmark skill in PE class. Skipping and alternating feet up and down stairs are often mastered by the age of 5 as body awareness and bilateral coordination are developed.

If your child has difficulty with these types of activities then try these ideas:

- Knowing how to hop on one foot is KEY. If your child can't hop on one foot yet, then stand on one foot.
- Cross crawls, ski jumps, and hopping on one foot work on leg separation and coordination both sides of the body
 - Provide a verbal reminder like "step-hop, step-hop" while skipping, or sing a song!

Occupational Therapy

We are off to a great start this year in OT. It has been a pleasure to meet and get to know the students and staff at Dexter Elementary. Mrs. Stevenson is so happy to be part of this great group!

This month in OT we have worked on a variety of skills to help students be successful in the classroom including fine motor skills, bilateral coordination skills, sensory processing skills, upper extremity strengthening, and of course... handwriting and grasp skills!

Children have the main occupation of PLAY. Here is a fun list of fall play activities to assist with multiple aspects of OT:

- Sensory- Go for a sensory walk, play in the leaves, or finger paint on a pumpkin
- Fine motor- Create pumpkin shapes out of play-doh, practice writing fall themed words on paper or whiteboard, trace leaves, sort candy, cut out shapes and make a Halloween pumpkin or ghost
- Gross motor- Create a spooky obstacle course, go to the pumpkin patch, help rake the leaves
